

What the Incarnation Means

One of our Advent Compline readings from the Church Fathers last year bothered me. I won't say who it was from because it is someone I like and I am sure I misheard what he intended, but it certainly sounded like a very anthropomorphic Second Person of the Holy Trinity was sitting around in eternity until the right time and then created a fetus in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary so he could pretend to be born and pretend to be a baby and pretend to grow up and then pretend not to be omniscient when he preached and then pretended to die so he could pretend to come back to life. The sad thing is that this is pretty much what a lot of Christians seem to believe.

What I understand the Incarnation to mean is that there is no pretense in God. God really became a human being. He didn't pretend anything about being human. He needed his mother to feed him and change his swaddling clothes and he really went through the adolescent angst of the human condition (an experience which makes me hope that those who believe in reincarnation are mistaken).

I have studied the arguments from the various contenders of the early Church Councils that argued about these things and the various definitions and particular terminologies that were eventually determined to be sound and orthodox. In spite of all that, I don't have a clue how it is possible for God to become a human being. It is beyond my ability to comprehend.

That doesn't mean it isn't true. I was very good at Euclidian geometry and Newtonian physics. I could follow the logic and the mathematics because I could comprehend them. I don't understand subatomic physics and the significance of the hunt for the Higgs boson. I can't comprehend things that function so far outside my own experience. That doesn't mean that they are not true. It just means that I can't comprehend them.

The traditional teaching of the Church about the Incarnation is something that I don't understand, but I believe passionately. We do not worship a God who is merely all-powerful, all-knowing, and all-loving. Our God is all those things and more: The Almighty has experienced human joy, human pain, human suffering and human victory. Incomprehensible as it seems, God not only possesses divinity; God possesses humanity.
