Meet a friend of St. Gregory's Abbey: Paula Durren of New Buffalo, Michigan -

"I first encountered St. Gregory's Abbey almost 40 years ago when I attended a vestry retreat for St. Paul's Episcopal Church in St. Joseph, Michigan. I had joined the Episcopal Church 3 years prior to that so I was relatively new to its liturgies. I fell in love with the Book of Common Prayer and all of its prayers. The weekend of the retreat at St. Gregory's Abbey I was deeply moved by the Benedictine life of prayer/worship of the monks and the beauty of its surroundings. It was the beginning of a long, meaningful relationship that has sustained me through the years. Since that time, I have made many retreats at the Abbey. It was the place I sought as a healing sanctuary after the death of each of my brothers and other loved ones. It was the place I sought as I was discerning a call to the priesthood in the Episcopal Church as well as a call to become the rector of Church of the Mediator in Harbert, Michigan.

Several years ago, while on retreat, Abbot Andrew approached me and asked if I would become the monks' confessor. He said that he and the community thought with my background as a counselor, my experience as an Episcopal priest and my long relationship with the community, it would work well. My initial internal reaction was 'I am not worthy,' yet I said I would pray on it. I spoke to my spiritual director, and she reminded me that God's love in Jesus made me/all of us worthy. So, I said yes, and became, as some of the monks call me, their Mother confessor. It has been a humbling relationship that has enriched my life with the community and more importantly my relationship with God. Each time I go to hear the confessions, the monks thank me, yet it is I who thank them."

TIME IS ETERNITY LIVING DANGEROUSLY

I have lived here at St. Gregory's Abbey for over half of my life. I've lived here since 1985, and when I think of how long ago it was when I enter the monastery, it rather blows my mind! Have I really been here for 38 years? I mean, that was last century! How weird is that?

I think one of the more frustrating aspects of growing older is that Time seems to speed up more with each passing year. I saw an ad for an album that I remember buying 10 years ago, only to realize that the ad was for that album's special 30th anniversary edition!

And to make things worse, I saw this ad ten years afterwards! All of a sudden, an album I think of as fresh and exciting is in most people's mind an older classic rock album (The Cure's "Disintegration".)

This experience makes me wonder what Time feels like if one could live 1000 years. Would one experience Time as going so fast that one could not even comprehend nor adapt to all the changes taking place seemingly so quickly? (I suspect that this experience of Time getting faster or shorter is why older people always seem to be behind the times as regards the latest trends and technology, so you younger readers, do be patient with us older ones.)

All this makes me wonder what Eternity will feel like. And what does it feel like to God, who's been around for, well, forever? As Scripture says, "With God a day is like a 1000 years, and a 1000 years is like a day." God's Time is not the same as our time. God is above our time, in what theologians call "Kairos", or "God's Time". Yet God, being God, also lives in our time with us (shown by Jesus being born and living in the midst of our time).





One of the ways the church practices "Kairos" is in its worship. Here at the Abbey we celebrate the Octave of Christmas, that is, the eight days after Christmas as if each day was Christmas day itself. (The only other time we celebrate an Octave is after Easter Day). Octaves are reserved for the church's two biggest holidays, and are celebrated because they are so important and so full of meaning that there is simply no way one day is adequate to celebrate them, so we extend our worship throughout the week, using the same liturgies as on the day itself. It it as if Time stops and those days last longer in order to enter more fully the Holy Mysteries of those days. So during the Christmas Octave at Vespers we chant this antiphon before and after the Magnificat:

Today Christ has been born, today the Savior has appeared, today angels sing on earth and archangels rejoice, today the just exult saying; Glory to God in the highest, alleluia.

This is my favorite chant in all the liturgy (and is used in Britten's "Advent Lessons And Carols".)

As for now, God has not shown us what Eternity will be like, except that it is beyond our imaginings, and that it will be rather marvelous. Everything will be the fulfillment of what God intended everything to become. It is as if God wants to surprise us.
